
This week we offer our prayers for the people of Afghanistan.



Catholic Identity Report – by Liz Tang, REL.

On Sunday, August the 22nd, we celebrate the Queenship of Mary.

What is the Queenship of Mary?

August contains two special days to honor the Blessed Mother, the Assumption and the Queenship of Mary. At the end of Mary's earthly life, she was assumed into heaven and upon entering she became Queen of Heaven. By looking into the Scriptures, how can we deduce these things? First, it would be hard to deny that Mary was the most faithful follower of Jesus. Second, it is completely undeniable that Mary is the mother of Jesus, the King of Kings, and therefore the queen



mother. At the Annunciation, Gabriel announced that Mary's Son would receive the throne of David and rule forever. At the Visitation, Elizabeth calls Mary "mother of my Lord." As in all the mysteries of Mary's life, she is closely associated with Jesus: Her queenship is a share in Jesus' kingship. Pope Pius XII established this feast in 1954.

Our **Catholic Identity Focus** for the coming week is: to focus on the Queenship of Mary and her devotion to God. Mary became the chosen mother of Jesus and therefore the queen of heaven.

This is a prayer we used last year during the Covid outbreak. I will include it again as a prayer for us to use, as we are still dealing with this pandemic!



Why do we need to know our times tables?

Learning one table makes it easier to learn others

By starting with basic tables and building up, children can learn number rules which will make learning other tables easier. For example, once you know your 2 times table, you can learn your 4 times table simply by doubling the answers!

Tables help with mental arithmetic

Memorising tables makes it far quicker and easier for children to work out maths problems in their heads. It can also help to develop the ability to internally add, subtract and divide!

Tables can help you understand other mathematical concepts

Knowing their times tables can also help your child more readily grasp other important aspects of maths, such as fractions, division and percentages.

Knowing your times tables increases confidence!

Perhaps most importantly, memorising their tables will give your child confidence in their own skills – there's nothing more 'grown up' than not having to use your fingers to work out an answer! This confidence will help them in other assessments, and ultimately, ease their move into secondary education.

We start to teach times tables at grade two, with the expectation that the students will know all of their times tables at the end of grade four. Families can help this process by encouraging students to practice their times tables whenever they can and use their homework tasks to guide their practice. Please speak to your child's teacher if you require further information about this process.

CHILDREN'S CHATTER MATTERS

Focus: Story grammar, telling narratives.

Ten activities will be provided over term four targeting your child's knowledge of story grammar. It is important for children to learn that stories generally have parts or a sequence to follow. Knowledge of this will improve your child's reading comprehension and narrative writing.

A story needs to have:

A setting: 'who' the story is about, 'where' the story is taking place and 'when' the story is taking place,

A problem which arises in the story,

Feelings: how the character feels about the problem,

A plan to fix the problem,

The action,

A solution to the problem.

An ending.

FROM FR TONY

On or near the Feast of the Assumption I often talk to children at a School Mass, and I try to get them to understand as well as they can that the Feast Day celebrates our belief that Our Lady was assumed body and soul into heaven. In the end I might say to them, more or less, that it's like much of what we believe - a mystery. With a mystery we believe something to be so without really understanding it, but accepting that it is so through faith.

In our beliefs there are many mysteries we accept with faith. We don't understand them all but we accept them nonetheless.

Some people simply can't accept what can't be proved, and they reject it utterly.

In today's Gospel we have the two types of people - some of Jesus' disciples who can't accept his teaching; as Jesus says, "there are some of you who don't believe." The other people are the disciples who don't necessarily understand completely, but still believe in Jesus because of the signs he gave them. As Simon Peter says so beautifully, "Lord, to whom would we go? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe."

Simon Peter's words speak of loyalty and faithfulness, two of the highest qualities of being human and being Christian.

Loyalty and faithfulness are the essential building blocks of marriage, family life, priesthood, and beyond into our world. They are essential to community life, to good government, to just about everything. Where there is no loyalty or faithfulness there is chaos.

They are often loyalty and faithfulness to an ideal or a belief or a set of rules. The people of AA would say it is the idea of the Higher Power; something greater than ourselves in whom we trust. Like so much that is in Sacred Scripture it comes down to being fully committed wherever our treasure lies. Our treasure lies with the Lord Jesus and to have him we will give up everything; he it is to whom we are fully committed. In St. Matthew's Gospel we hear of the parable of the treasure in the field. "The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure hidden in the field which a man found and hid. In his joy, he goes and sells all that he has, and buys the whole

field."

Perhaps in our prayer this week we might consider the great treasure we do indeed possess.
