

Sísters of St Joseph's Museum ín Sydney.



St Joseph's School is a Catholic Community in the Josephite tradition where we learn and grow in the Spirit together.





As you can see from our prayer this week, this Sunday, August 8th, is the Feast of Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop, our first Australian Saint. We give thanks for this extraordinary woman. Mary MacKillop was an educator, a pioneer and a leader, someone who had compassion for others regardless of their



situation. She also faced many difficulties in her efforts to start her Religious Order. Galvanised by her belief in the value of education as the foundation for a fulfilling life, Mary's motto was 'never see a need without doing something about it'. She and her Sisters were instrumental in starting many schools across Australia, including St Joseph's Nagambie. Mary's legacy of helping all people in need, with the aim of creating more connected, stronger communities is so important today and calls us all to follow her loving example.

Do all the good they can and never see a need without doing something about it. This is their mission...

Catholic Identity Report – by Liz Tang, REL.

Coming up on Sunday, August the 8th, we celebrate the Feast Day of Mary MacKillop.

Mary MacKillop's Story

Mary MacKillop was born on 15 January 1842 in Melbourne, Victoria. Her parents were born in Scotland and came to live in Australia. She had three sisters and four brothers.

Mary cared about the people who had no one to look after them such as boys and girls who just roamed the streets, children in the country who had no school to go to, people who were old and sick and people who had nowhere to live. Mary wanted more than anything to help these people did.



Mary went to work as a teacher in a little country town in South Australia called Penola. There she met Father Julian Tenison Woods who also wanted to do something for the poor children who could not afford to pay the money needed to go to school. Together, in 1866, they began the first St Joseph's School in an old stable. Two of Mary's younger sisters also taught in the school and other young women came to help them.

On 19 March 1866 (St Joseph's Day) Mary started to wear a simple black dress and began the Congregation of the Sisters of St Joseph. Now as a Sister, she dedicated her life to doing God's work. As more and more young women joined Mary as Sisters, they were able to start more schools. All children were welcome at the Josephite schools, which provided free Catholic education.

In Adelaide, they opened a place for women who had nowhere to live, an orphanage for children who had no parents to look after them and a house where poor people could come and stay. The Sisters visited people who were in gaol and those who were poor and sick.

Mary MacKillop was kind to all people, even if they did not agree with her. She died on 8 August 1909 in Alma Cottage, North Sydney. Mary helped many people during her lifetime and after she died, the Sisters of St Joseph kept on doing the good work she had started.

Mary MacKillop kept her faith in God and bravely challenged those who did not support her vision for a more caring world. Mary is an important Australian who spent her life helping people, especially children. She is Australia's first Saint.

Every student should be reading every day at home, whether it is reading aloud to an adult or sibling or

reading to themselves. Reading with children, especially struggling readers, on a regular basis does take time

but the benefits speak for themselves. Here are eight of the most

important.

1. Improves Reading Skills

First, exposure to books improves children's reading skills. Practice makes

perfect!

2. Boosts Vocabulary and Literacy Skills

Reading increases vocabulary, comprehension and communication skills in addition to sentence structure,

grammar, punctuation and expression will improve.

3. Improves Writing Skills

Exposure to new words, grammar and punctuation will improve children's writing

4. Builds Confidence and Independence

Reading every day builds independence, leading to greater confidence.

5. Broadens Minds and Develops Empathy

Diverse literature opens children's minds to the lives of other people. Subsequently, helping children make sense of the world around them.

6. Academic Success

Regular reading promotes academic achievement across the curriculum. Non-fiction books provide

opportunities for children to increase their knowledge and interests.

7. Develops Imagination

While reading children create new worlds. This develops their creativity and empathy as they immerse themselves in the lives of the characters.

8. Reading is Fun!

When reading with a child, they can tell if the adult is enjoying themselves. Reinforce the message that reading is an enjoyable alternative to video games and TV by being a good reading role-model.



CHILDREN'S CHATTER MATTERS 4. Where's Wally?



You can use a Where's Wally? book to practice lots of expressive language skills.

Choose a page and try some of the following ideas:

Because scenes can be quite overwhelming, make a window so that you can place a piece of paper with a square cut out in the middle and block out the rest of the images on the page.

IS/ARE: pictures for is/are sentences such as "The man is skiing" and "The girls are skating" are plentiful on every page. If you find a man skiing, challenge your child to find groups of people doing the same thing to get a great range of 'is' and 'are' sentences.

PLURALS: go on a plural hunt. Challenge your child by taking turns and counting upwards I can see; 1 cat, 2 dogs, 3 mummies, 4 pyramids, 5 ladders etc. until you can't find something with that number.

VERBS: go on a verb hunt. Let's find 20 different actions people are doing. It's simple, but it gives a lot of insight into a child's vocabulary and opportunities for learning new vocabulary.

VERB TENSES: Verb tenses change meaning of sentences so it's important to get them right. First choose a page and think if the picture scene shows something that happened in the past/a long time ago, could be happening now, or in the future. Once you have decided the right 'time' practice their past, present or future tenses.

CONJUNCTIONS: Find something in the picture and point to it, then ask your child to tell you what is happening and why, to encourage conjunctions and complex sentences. Make sure they answer with a complete sentence and use the conjunction in the middle to expand their answer.

ADJECTIVES: go on an adjective hunt. If children are unsure about what an adjective is you could use an acronym like SCUMPS for the different types of adjectives you're looking for (Size, Colour, Uses, Materials, Parts, Shape etc.) Provide a sentence structure for the child "I can see an ... enormous, yellow canary.". See how many objects related to different adjectives you can locate in the picture in 5 minutes.

REFLECTION ON MARY MACKILLOP FROM ARCHBISHOP MARK COLERIDGE 8/8/2013

Mary MacKillop has this most extraordinary trust in the providence of God. She was at the same time not one to wait around passively. She was an extraordinary doer. An extremely capable woman, but again, beyond all her capacities and energies, there blazes at the heart of Mary MacKillop this trust in the providence of God and a trust that never failed her.

She may have been on the brink again and again and again, but mysteriously and marvellously Mary MacKillop never goes over. Her trust in providence, strange as it may seem to us and extremely risky as it may have been, never failed her and her sisters.

It was that fact that grounded her gratitude. All her worries and anxieties, which should have destroyed her, and certainly destroyed her work, in fact had the opposite effect. That's why she stands forever as Mary of the Cross, the Cross of the Lord Jesus.

There are many crosses in the world but all bar one of those crosses destroys the human being. The only cross that has the opposite effect, it creates the human being, is the cross of Christ. And she never forgot that. The name that she bore in religion was and will be forever St Mary of the Cross. That which should have destroyed her in fact created her, just as the crucifixion should have destroyed the Lord Jesus but did not. It only provoked the eternal thunder of the resurrection.

Long and painful experience has taught me that I cannot trust my own efforts to speak as candidly as I would desire, and that I can do in writing what I cannot otherwise. I can only account for it in this way: when writing I feel



alone with God, and as he knows all things, am not kept back by any fear of what he may think, or how regard what I am doing: but it seems to be a fault in myself which I cannot overcome, not to speak as I can write. Even when I have written what I wish to say, I am often tempted to destroy it, anything rather than deliver it to the person for whom it is intended.
